

In directing a production of 'Oliver!' one is very aware not only of the film of the musical but also the films made of Dickens' story of 'Oliver Twist'. Having been at school with the first Oliver and living in the same town as the second, I was delighted to find the latest Roman Polanski version a timely inspiration! But I've just noticed 'The perfect family DVD' attached to its box, which revives our dilemma of how far should this musical production be just a happy 'family' show.

Director's Thoughts

We have tried to resolve this dilemma by emphasising the contrasts of the story, its lights and shades, the lively welcome Oliver receives in London with 'Consider Yourself' set against the irony and violence of the later 'Fine Life' quartet. It was interesting to find Fagin's light-hearted play-acting in 'Pick a Pocket' reflected in the monochrome starkness of David Lean's classic. Ensuring that the levity of Ron Moody is merged with the menace of Alec Guinness has been an absorbing challenge for our own talented 'Jew'!



Of course one of the additional pleasures of Players' amateur productions is the scale of our choruses. We decided early on not

to reject anyone who came to our 'community' auditions, and 'Oliver!' gives a wide range of opportunities for chorus acting and singing, in the Workhouse for the youngest,

in Fagin's Gang for older youngsters, and in the London crowd for all ages to come together in numerous mass movements! By a stroke of pure serendipity we are fortunate that Helen Lewis has rejoined us as choreographer, and her contribution has added a wonderful extra dimension to the large chorus numbers.

It has been a delight to be able to cast so many familiar and talented characters from past productions in this show, 'John The Baptist' as 'Sowerberry', 'Haig' as 'Bumble', 'Jesus' as 'Fagin', 'Becket' as 'Brownlow'! But it is the new and younger members of the cast - some of them with ages you wouldn't believe - who are likely to steal the show. We are so grateful for all the support we have had, particularly from sympathetic parents who have helped to maintain a longer than usual rehearsal schedule.
