#### SYNOPSIS

#### Prologue: Toulon 1815

The Chain Gang is working. Javert tells one of the prisoners, Jean Valjean, that he is to be released on parole. Unable to find work or a place to stay he is befriended by a Bishop and stays in his house overnight. Valjean steals some silver and is questioned by constables. He tells them the Bishop gave him the silver. Valjean is surprised when the Bishop not only backs up his lie but also gives him two candlesticks, asking that he use the silver to become an honest man.

#### Act 1

#### Montreuil-sur-Mer 1823

#### 1. 'At the End of the Day'

Valjean has assumed a new identity as Mayor Madeleine and has opened a factory. A group of workers express their despair at the impoverished lives they lead. One of them, Fantine, is thrown onto the streets where she has to make a living to provide for her child, Cosette. Her story, with the song 'I Dreamed a Dream' illustrates the fate of destitute women of the time.

#### 2. 'The Docks'/'Cart Crash'

Fantine sells her hair and resists the advances of Bamatabois. Valjean comes to her aid and learns of his part in her dismissal from the factory. He demands her release. Suddenly, a man is trapped by a runaway cart. Valjean saves him. Javert reflects that he has only seen one other man with such strength whom he has just re-arrested. Valjean reveals his own identity.

#### 3. 'Fantine's Death'

Valjean comes to Fantine's bedside where he promises to look after her child. Fantine dies as Javert appears. Valjean begs to be allowed to find Cosette. Javert refuses, a fight ensues and Valjean escapes.

#### 4. 'Little Cosette'/'The Innkeeper's Song' (Master of the House)

The action moves to an Inn where Cosette dreams of a better life, away from Monsieur and Madame Thenardier, a disreputable pair of rogues. In the lively Inn scene they let us into the secrets of their corrupt life-style. As they finish, Jean Valjean appears with the frightened Cosette and pays the Thenardier's for her ("The Bargain").

#### 5. 'The Beggars'/'The Robbery'

Prouvaire/constable/sailor

Valjean and Cosette are giving money to the beggars in the streets of Paris where we also find the students, led by Enjolras. Gavroche, a young street urchin warns Marius, one of the students, about Thenardier's gang including their daughter, Eponine, whose love for Marius is unrequited. He sees Cosette for the first time and falls instantly in love. Thenardier's gang attempts to rob Valjean but Javert foils the plot. Valjean has been recognized as an ex-convict. Javert declares his intention to catch the fugitive in 'Stars', and Marius begs Eponine to help him find Cosette.

#### 6. 'ABC Café'/'The People's Song'

The students meet to plan their insurrection. Marius enters thinking of Cosette. Gavroche announces the death of Lamarque, a popular military leader. Enjoiras believes that his death will bring about revolution and the students take to the streets to rally the people.

#### 7. 'Rue Plumet'/'The Attack on the Rue Plumet'

Cosette has fallen in love with Marius and talks to Valjean about their lonely life. Eponine brings Marius to her where he expresses his love. ('A Heart Full Of Love'). They are interrupted by Thenardier's gang who attempt a robbery. Marius and Cosette are alerted by Eponine. Convinced that it's Javert, Valjean decides they must leave.

#### 8. 'One Day More'

Lost in their individual thoughts, the characters reflect on the future. Valjean, for ever on the run; Cosette and Marius on their new found love; Eponine on her unrequited love; Enjolras enlisting Marius for the revolution; Javert and the Thenardiers predicting that the revolution will fail.

#### Act 2

#### 9. 'Building the Barricades'

The students build the barricades. Eponine dressed as a boy, is asked by Marius to take a letter to Cosette. Reading the letter, Valjean learns of Marius' feelings for Cosette. Singing 'On My Own' Eponine expresses her feelings for Marius and returns to the barricades.

#### 10. 'Javert at the Barricade'

The students are joined by Javert, pretending to be on their side. Gavroche reveals his true identity and the students capture him. Eponine returns, fatally injured, and dies in Marius' arms.

#### 11. 'The First Attack'/'Bring Him Home'

Jean Valjean appears; after saving Enjolras' life he asks that the spy, Javert, be given to him, and Javert is released. The students rest and reflect on their friendship and days gone by ('The Night'). Valjean prays for Marius' safety in battle.

#### 12. 'The Second Attack'

The people have not risen to join the revolution. The students need the ammunition that lies in the streets and argue about who should get them. Meanwhile, Gavroche scrambles up the barricade and is killed.

#### 13. 'The Final Attack' / 'The Sewers'

The students refuse to surrender and the army mounts a fierce attack. Valjean carries the wounded Marius through the sewers and collapses. Thenardier appears stripping the dead of their valuables, whilst robbing Marius, he recognizes Valjean. Javert confronts Valjean and allows him to take Marius to safety.

#### 14. 'Javert's Suicide'/'The Café Song'


Javert realizes that his own life is meaningless and commits suicide. The futility of the revolution is discussed by the women as they comment on the events. Marius finds difficulty accepting that he has survived and begs forgiveness from his dead companions.


#### 15. 'Marius and Cosette'/'The Wedding'


Marius does not know who saved him at the barricade. Valjean reveals his past and makes Marius promise not to tell Cosette. Later, at their Wedding, the Thenardiers tell Marius the truth about Valjean, and he realizes who rescued him. The Thenardiers celebrate their new found wealth.

#### 16. 'The Epilogue'


Valjean is dying. Marius tells Cosette that her father was the man who saved him. Valjean explains about her mother. A vision of Fantine is joined by Eponine, followed by the other 'ghosts' and the entire company to sing of 'the music of a people who are climbing to the light.'



















