The local community had a double treat this Christmas as the Players put on its first live show since the start of the pandemic. Its regular Christmas Show was held in St. Mary's Church, Charlton Kings, and people were able to enjoy its usual programme of carols, readings, and sketches. To support people who could not attend in person, a video was made which was released after the show, and also supported those who wished to participate from home to contribute. The video is a mixture of home recordings and some made during the live performance. The overall theme this year was the Nativity centred on the stable and the journey to Bethlehem.

The videos released continue to be available from the Players web site as part of its library of productions and other events. Very supportive comments were received from those who watched the videos, and the opportunity for attending a live show was really welcomed by those who came.

Let Us Be Merry 2021 - live or digital?

Desperate to get back to live performing, the CKCP Committee watched with great interest the COVID-19 pandemic, the big question being 'Would we be able to perform live, or would we need to produce a video again as we did in 2020?' The situation was still so uncertain in September 2021 when we held our meeting to discuss content that we decided we would have to do both!

The call went out to the mailing list asking performers to come forward to join a choir and to perform sketches and readings, and we soon had a great programme lined up. A socially distanced carol singing session held in October in St Mary's Church, Charlton Kings, to record the audience carols reminded us of the joy of getting together to perform, and enthusiasm for a live performance built up.

Throughout October, the performers and compère (Martyn Fry) recorded their pieces and sent them to Peter Ryan who put together the digital version of the show, and thanks must go to Peter Ryan and Martin Grinter who facilitated and manipulated the recordings to ensure the quality of the production, and to Keith Mead for accompanying the singers and choir, and providing the incidental music.

Thank goodness Omicron didn't gain momentum before our first live performance of LUBM for two years and, with great excitement, we gathered at St Mary's Church on 4th December to perform.

For the first time, the show was held in the afternoon rather than the evening, and feedback from the audience on this change of timing would be gratefully received.

We were pleased with the audience numbers and, with over 40 performers taking part, the decision to go ahead with a live show was the right one. The video was released a little over a week later accompanied by a recording of 'Melissa's Dress' produced and performed by Tony and Sandra Jeans.

Following the live show and the release of the digital production, donations have been sent to Cheltenham Samaritans, CK Guiding

and **Shelter**, and I would like to thank everyone who donated to these worthy causes.

The Players have been providing street theatre on Good Friday since 1992. Videos were made available for 2020 and 2021 as a result of the pandemic and continue to be available for viewing from the Players' web site..
