It took about a year to collect wartime stories from local people in Charlton Kings, or from people who live here now but were living elsewhere during WW2.

Some thirty-six people

contributed to the collection which is available in electronic form. This was used to develop the script for the show. Even when it was opening night more anecdotes continued to be shared, and display books were quickly put together and were available 'front of house'.

Six local people in particular were featured especially and were introduced to the audience in the interval on each night of the performance.

Sadly three of these are no longer with us and in this newsletter we pay tribute to two of them – the ladies of the WRNS (the 'Wrens'). Beryl served at Bletchley Park on code breaking, and Harriet in on the Orkneys as part of the support for the dangerous mission looking after the convoys to supply Russia.

Script extract from Beryl's story:

"We were told that the messages we were helping to crack were from the Japanese who were stationed in Berlin. They were describing what the Germans were planning to do to combat our invasion along the French Coast. This gave us a great deal of information as we planned to invade. We knew where the German Forces would be and their plans. We were the Japanese Naval Unit in Hut 7 attached to Hut 8 *(Enigma)*. Apparently the Japanese used our alphabet for their codes. We worked in shifts, days, evenings or nights. Our machine arrived and was housed in its own room. All the plugs had to go in a certain order and only a few of us did the plugging. We always wore uniforms. I remember the white shirts and separate collars rather stiff-starched."

Celebrations in London VE Day

"We celebrated VE Day by hitching to London. We spent the night in the park after celebrating in Leicester Square, and visiting Buckingham Palace where the King and Queen came out on the balcony to wave to us. It was May and a very warm night. We were given three days off."

Celebrations in Cambridge on VJ Day

"As we were cracking Japanese codes we had to carry on until Japan surrendered. Then, my colleague Harry and I celebrated by going to Cambridge. Harry stayed at his College - Trinity and I at the YWCA.. We spent the day punting on the Cam – the weather was excellent – it was August."

Script extract from Harriet's story:

"We Wrens were on Orkney operating the switch boards. My fiancé was on the escort carrier HMS Trumpeter. Another escort carrier the HMS Nabob, was torpedoed off the coast of Norway – 'tin fished' we called it. The Captain decided to limp back to Scapa Flow with a skeleton crew over a thousand miles – they made it – I watched them come in."

'Some Sunny Day' – performed by the Community Players in February 2017 – was based on the wartime experience of Charlton Kings villagers in WW2. Beryl Middleton, whose death we are sad to be recording in this issue, was one of those villagers who shared their experiences of the war.

Beryl was a Wren who served in Bletchley Park, code breaking messages from the Japanese who were based in Berlin. The messages described what the Germans were planning to do to combat the invasion along the French coast. She remembered the uniform – 'white shirts and separate collars rather stiff-starched'. She recalled the celebrations for VE Day and VJ Day and saw the King and Queen on the balcony of Buckingham Palace, having hitched to London to join in the celebrations of VE Day in Leicester Square.

Not only was Beryl a contributor to **'Some Sunny Day'** though. She was a supporter of the Players from the start, taking part in special events in the Residential Homes and at Harvest Suppers in the village, and performing in **'Whose birthday did you say?'** as an Egyptologist.

Beryl was one of a dwindling generation whose recollections of WW2 are so important as a record of that time and we are very grateful that she shared her memories with us. She will be missed by all who knew her. Harriet Wright

It is with great sadness we record the passing of Harriet. She came to local shows and was so pleased to feature in the Players' community-led production of **'Some Sunny Day'**. It was a great privilege to have not only one but <u>two</u> former serving members from the WRNS as part of the show. Thus this tribute not only reflects their support of the Players, but also the important rôle that they played in the drama of those times.

For Harriet it was being stationed and operating from what was a most dangerous part of the world. The station was part of the Scapa Flow complex, the main home base for the Royal Navy in WW2. *"The worst journey in the world"* is how Winston Churchill is quoted as describing the Allied convoys to Russian from 1941 to 1945.

We spent many hours with Harriet, listening to what she had to tell us and looking at all her memorabilia of those times.

Harriet was an invited guest at the service for WW2 veterans at Westminster Abbey commemorating the 70th anniversary of VE Day and was part of the parade.

The first treat for the audience was the programme itself which asked a series of questions to add to the intrigue, and to be introduced to a range of characters, which we might all recognise as hilarious stereotypes. However, it still sent out the message of the fears of those who change their lifestyle of living in their own home to being reliant on a residential environment. The audience was with the residents all the way as they plotted and challenged those who attempted to acquire the property by, shall we say, less than 'honest means'.

Well, we met a variety of characters during the production from Daphne Juliet, who read lot of Barbara Cartland', to Jack а Prendegast, a former associate of Del Boy, to Oscar Romero, the George Clooney of Chelters. I expect by now you have got the drift of the characterisation which was expected by the Players' usual high standard of acting. There were also those who were the visitors including a Howard Aitken, MP who was a 'friend' of matron, an Aerobics teacher and the dreaded 'Acquisition Executive' who was very much a Cruella-deville type. Who was she working for one might ask. Then there were the hard working staff.

So very much one of the Players' successes, providing entertainment in the community, affording opportunities for people of all ages to perform and carry out the essential tasks necessary to mount a successful show. The Players have donated widely to charities and local projects over the years at this time the total stands at over Thirty Thousand pounds.
